## UNDERSTAND THE STANDARDS

Sometimes two words are spelled alike but have different meanings. Such words are called **multiple-meaning words**. You will often see them in your reading.

**Words to Know**

multiple-meaning word

- To find which meaning the writer uses, look at how the word is used in the sentence. Other words in the sentence can help you figure out what the word means.

For example, squash can be

- a verb (action word) meaning “crush” or “smash”
- a noun (name word) meaning a type of vegetable like pumpkin or zucchini
- a noun meaning a type of ball game
